Penny distinctly remembers becoming more involved with horses around the year 2001 when she started her riding lessons and volunteering at GRACE (Georgian Riding Association for Challenged Riders) near Owen Sound. When Penny volunteered, she would help with other individual's lessons by being a side walker, leading the horse, brushing/grooming the horse, tacking up, and cleaning the barn.

After a few years of riding

and volunteering at GRACE, Penny then started to ride at Windsong Carriage and Ranch where she spent several years helping around the farm and attending lessons. Penny played a huge role helping Windsong go to weddings, funerals, and parades with the horses.

Penny and the horses have traveled all over Ontario including Toronto, Niagara Falls, London, Kitchener and Oakville where she accompanied a horse into a mall. You may remember also seeing Penny at the Festival of Northern Lights helping to organize the horse-drawn carriage rides around Owen Sound or at the Salmon Spectacular.

More recently, Penny has connected with Dream Chasers Equestrian Centre (DCEC) in Kilsyth. With

the help of Passport, Penny's journey with DCEC started in September of 2020. When Penny started her weekly lessons at DCEC, her coach started by assessing Penny's skills and knowledge around horses. Penny's coach was amazed with the amount of experience, knowledge, and talent Penny had when it came to working with the horses.

Starting with Gator, Penny started to showcase her skills around brushing and tacking up, to asking Gator to walk and jog around the arena. It wasn't too long before Arthur then caught her eye and Penny started to ride him during her lessons. With Arthur, Penny focused on loping, groundwork (lunging), and even jumping! Since then, Penny has had the opportunity to ride several other horses including Bailey,

Jackie said it took her a minute to realize, "that he wanted to be the performer of that concert." Jackie has helped Glen with three concert dates on Facebook live, all of which have gotten very positive feedback from those who viewed them.

With Jackie's help, Glen has performed on his front porch and in his living room showing off his musical talents and sharing his musical journey. Jackie is hopeful that when the weather warms up Glen might be able to invite friends and neighbours around for a "true concert" on his front lawn.

When Glen plays his music for others he hopes to brighten their day just a little bit and put a smile on their faces. So, if you are lucky you might just get to see or hear an original Glen Eden concert sometime soon.

Each individual is unique in their strengths and support needs and take an active part in not only setting goals but planning for themselves to reach their goal.





Continued from front programs opened, people moved from institutions and I was given the job of overseeing things along with the task of managing community participation supports. That's when my formal DS education began. Fortunately for me I had good teachers in the people we supported, their families and the community as a whole.

This good fortune carried on with the executive director position with Community Living Owen Sound and District. There I learned of the benefits of having a robust, integrated set of core values ingrained in the day-to-day work along with the underlying principle of person-centred approaches. How unique and rewarding the organization's commitment to self-directed teams was, allowing staff at all levels and roles the authority to take initiative to support people and families to attain personal goals in whatever manner made sense, without someone looking over their shoulder. I also was grateful that our association offered supports not just to adults but also to families, infants and children. Building these foundational links with people at an early age is so much better than being introduced at graduation day.

When I arrived in 2004 the association was still feeling its way around the organizational changes undertaken during the

previous decade. The switch from programs to personcentered supports, adoption of self-directed teams, the creation of The Support Pool (dedicated staff group supporting people across multiple program lines). The closure of the sheltered workshop and large group home settings. We were struggling with how to ensure supports were fairly distributed throughout our large geography. I am pleased that we managed to come through all of these indecisions and questioning and came out the other side standing strong and proud.

I am confident we are over the hump on this journey to inclusion, the really hard slugging is over and now we can look forward to the momentum carrying us forward. I am confident in saying this just by watching recent graduates come to us today with the expectation of inclusion built in. This is the world our children and grandchildren grew up experiencing and the world they will expect to see in the future.

I cannot say enough about the friendships and relationships I have made over the years; supportive board members, an all-star leadership team, amazingly talented and caring group of staff, the honest and appreciative individuals we support thank you to one and all. Sincerely, Rick Hill

We plan to discuss future playgroup date possibilities on the Facebook group. We hope to remain outdoors if at all possible due to COVID-19. Our goal is to have a playgroup date every few months while we are just starting out. This could certainly increase in frequency if there is interest from our group members.

If playgroup numbers increase and there is interest in this development, we hope to introduce an adaptive sports league in Grey Bruce. One of the organizers of our playgroup, Jeff Virgo,

has a lot of experience with adaptive sports. He has competed in the Invictus Games, has participated in many adaptive sports events and also sits on the board of ParaSport Ontario. We hope that children with disabilities as well as their family members and friends would enjoy trying out different adaptive sports in the area since no leagues are currently available in Grey Bruce.

At this point, the playgroup is for children and youth in Grey Bruce with all types of disabilities and neurodivergence and their families/ caregivers. We have encouraged the participation of siblings and friends in the playgroup to facilitate inclusion and increase connections amongst the young participants.

He is a young (seven years old) and vibrant black Percheron Cross thoroughbred horse that is 17 hands high (a hand equals 4 inches) and weighs about 1800 lbs! Together, Elliot and Penny have worked hard at skills such as barrel racing, riding both Western and English, riding bareback, navigating natural and man-made obstacles, leg yielding, posting, side passing, turning on forehand and haunches, synchronized riding, trimming hooves, and even riding bareback with no hands!

All these skills that Penny has learned has helped her to increase her knowledge



around horses and has helped her to compete recently in the Dream Chaser's Barn Show. At the show, Penny placed 2nd and 3rd twice (Elliot was the best at bobbing for apples!).

Penny is thankful for all she has been able to accomplish with her riding, including helping to train Elliot to be a lesson horse (he is still learning). Penny says riding has made her more confident and pushed her out of her comfort zone. She is always learning new things and is happy to share her knowledge with anyone who is interested. Penny recommends horseback riding to everyone. For her it is a chance to focus on the horse and forget what is going on in the outside world.

With all the skills Penny has acquired over the years, she is thrilled to be working hard with Elliot towards her goal of competing in the 2022 Equestrian Paralympics! Stay tuned... Penny hopes there is much more to come.

Owen Sound Self Advocates

In the last year I have had the opportunity to join a great group of people called Sound Advocates. Sound Advocates is a group that gives a voice to people who need help finding their voice.

In December 2021 the Sound Advocates did a Christmas fundraiser event through the offices of Community Living Owen Sound and District. The fundraiser was for Chapman House, the local Hospice in Grey-Bruce. The members of the Sound Advocates made signs, donation containers, and ballots for our fundraiser. We

then distributed the donation containers around to each of the Community Living Owen Sound and District locations.

Each time a Community Living staff member made a donation they could fill out a ballot with their name and Community Living phone number. The ballots were for a gift basket that had items to make a Christmas dinner.

All the members of the Sound Advocates helped to make this fundraiser a success, from making signs and decorating donation containers, taking donation containers around to each Community Living location, putting together the gift basket, going to the bank or collecting all the donations and helping to count them up.

At our last meeting in December, we counted up the donations and picked a winner of the gift basket. In total we raised \$115 for Chapman House. The winner of the Christmas dinner gift basket was Community Living staff member Stephanie.

From the Desks of the Family Support Team —Transitioning to Adult Services

Transitioning to adult services is a process that benefits greatly from advanced planning and preparation. It is important to consider that your child is essentially moving from a system of entitlement (the public education system) to a system of limited and finite resources (adult developmental services).

Upon turning 18, children's services such as Special Services at Home, Assistance for Children with Severe Disabilities or services through the Ontario Autism Program end.

There are different supports and services available to a person over the age of 18 such as the Ontario Disability Support Program (ODSP) and services through Developmental Services Ontario (DSO) including Passport funding. To be considered for adult developmental services you must apply to DSO to determine eligibility. ODSP also requires an application process to determine eligibility.

When can I apply? To reduce the service gap between children and adult services, you should start the DSO application process early and apply at age 16. With all of the correct documents, you can be confirmed eligible for adult developmental services at age 16, however, the services will not start until age 18 (at the earliest). While your son or daughter might be eligible for service in the adult system, they may be on a waiting list for some time.

In order to help make these application processes go more smoothly some foundational work or documentation will be required. A recommended timeline is provided below.

KEY TIMELINES:

By Age 11

• Apply for your dependant's Canadian Passport. (It's easier as a child's signature is not required until age 12).

Age 12-16

- Open a bank account for your child, if you haven't already done so.
- Ensure legal documentation for identification is in place (birth certificate, health card, Social Insurance Number (your child needs a SIN if you plan to open an RDSP).
- Explore having a psychological assessment completed or whether an updated assessment may be required for your child.
- Start your planning processes to exit from secondary school. Involve your family support worker and others helpful to this process.

- Encourage community-based job training (co-op programs) and life skills if these are appropriate activities for your child. Involve your child in all decision-making.
- Apply for an Ontario Photo Card at Service Ontario.
 This is a government-issued photo identification card for Ontarians who do not drive.
- Contact DSO Southwest Region at 1-855-437-6797 for intake and confirmation of eligibility — you will need documentation confirming age, Ontario residency, and a psychological assessment. Your family support worker can assist you with this process.

Age 17-21

• Begin thinking about health care services that need to change as your child reaches adulthood, i.e., changing from pediatrician to family doctor.

• Contact ODSP to apply for Income Support before age 18 (six to three months before turning 18).

The adult developmental service system is complex with many people accessing the services that are currently available and many waiting for supports. The most successful transitions occur when planning starts early and when the youth, their family, the school and service providers work together to develop a plan for the future. It's never too early to start planning.

Transition planning is not an easy task and it is likely to be overwhelming at times, but you do not have to face it alone.

Please do not hesitate to reach out to your family support worker with any questions or if you require assistance in navigating all that is involved in transitioning to adult services.
